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Blue Ceiling Dance Presents:

The animals are planning an intervention
Choreographed and performed by Lucy Rupert
A live dance performance reimagined for the camera
As a benefit to the Myeloma Canada Foundation
April 29 - May 5, 2022

Originally created when Lucy was a new mother, this solo dance performances tackles the paradox of intense instincts and acute awareness of one's own mortality which the process of becoming a mother revealed. The original solo was lush and emotional, a somatic conversation with an audience, a silent philosophical hypothesis and a depiction of a creature moving through many different bodies.

Reworked for camera 11 years later, Lucy applies to the original choreography her more recent explorations at the nexus of art and science, embodying four stages of molting in insects, the neuroscience that connects the "gut" to the brain, and the experience of reaching the same age that her mother was when she died, of multiple myeloma cancer.

For several years, Lucy has wanted to do a special performance in honour of her mother and in support of Myeloma Canada, an organization which supports myeloma patients and families, with a particular focus on equitable access to care. This performance event is the first in a five-year project, the "happyfury project", in which Lucy is committed to producing an annual performance event dedicated to not-for-profits which sometimes fall under the radar of the general population.

A further inspiration to make this project happen now is the passing of the inimitable Helen Donnelly, to multiple myeloma cancer in January 2022. Helen was a cross-disciplinary artist, known and loved by many in the Toronto clowning, circus, dance, theatre and comedy communities as well as the founder of Red Nose Remedy. Helen was a pioneer in developing a training program for therapeutic clowning, as well as sparkling wit and unmatchable performer.

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# **Lucy Rupert**

A passionate and hyperkinetic performer, Lucy trained at the University of Waterloo in the Dance and Music Depts. simultaneously gearing for careers in dance and music performance. In 2003 Lucy obtained a Master of Arts degree in History from the University of Toronto. She is the founder and artistic director of Blue Ceiling dance through which she creates, performs, commissions, and produces contemporary dance and teaches movement classes for all bodies. As a freelance artist in dance and theatre, Lucy has been fortunate to work with noted Canadian companies Fujiwara Dance Inventions, Chartier Danse, Anandam Dance, Sashar Zarif Dance, Little Pear Garden Collective, Puppetmongers Theatre, and Theatre Passe Muraille, and to dance in the works of William Yong, Martha Hart, Allison Cummings and Angela Blumberg among others. She was a regular performer with Theatre Rusticle from 2001-2017. Lucy is a two-time recipient of a Chalmers Fellowship, a two-time nominee for the KM Hunter award in dance, and a finalist for the inaugural Johanna Metcalf awards of 2019.

### John Lauener

Vancouver born, Toronto based photographer John Lauener has spent a career as a photographer specializing in dance, theatre, music and more while also enjoying success early in his career as a fashion photographer, living and working in Europe for several years. A graduate of Sheridan College's Applied Photography programme, John's work in fashion, dance, theatre and music has been published extensively throughout Canada as well as the U.S., Europe and Japan. More recently John has also been working in video and film, creating short dance films that have screened at festivals across Canada as well as in South America and Europe. Through the pandemic, he has been involved in intimate and imaginative livestream performance productions. He continues to work closely with dance and theatre artists on both archival and promotional videos.
